Potential Essay Questions – 1 of 2 – 50 Points

1. What role did slavery play in the early development of the colonial economy? How had slavery come to surpass indentured servitude as the primary source of labor in the colonies?
2. Explain how whites justified holding African slaves, and discuss their reasons for owning slaves. Describe where slaves came from and how they traveled to America. Be sure to give examples to support your conclusions.
3. Evaluate the goals, methods, and leadership of the abolitionist movement. What methods proved most effective? Why? Be sure to give examples to support your conclusions.
4. What were the circumstances that created the national crisis of 1850? Who were the major players and what were the major issues of the Compromise of 1850?
5. At what point in America's history did the Civil War inevitable? Identify the crucial compromises of the first half of America's history that related to the issue of slavery.
6. Identify the major advantages and disadvantages of the United States and the Confederacy. Was a northern victory in the war a foregone conclusion in 1860/1861?
7. Describe the plans for Reconstruction offered by Abraham Lincoln, Andrew Johnson, and Congress. What was the goal of each plan? How did each plan propose to accomplish its goals? Be sure to give examples to support your conclusions.
