Midland College Syllabus RNSG 1201 Pharmacology (2-0-0)

Required Participation:

For online classes, students MUST actively participate by completing an academic assignment by the official census date. Students who do not do so will be dropped from the course.

Course Description:

Introduction to the science of pharmacology with emphasis on the actions, interactions, adverse effects, and nursing implications of drug classifications. Content includes the roles and responsibilities of the nurse in safe administration of medications within a legal/ethical framework. This course lends itself to either a blocked or integrated approach.

Prerequisite: BIOL 2401. Corequisite: BIOL 2402.

End-of-Course Outcomes:

Identify the roles and responsibilities of the professional nurse in administering pharmacological agents; and explain the safe utilization of medications.

Student Learning Outcomes:

The following course student learning outcomes (SLO)s are based on the Differentiated Essential Competencies (DECs) identified by the Texas Board of Nursing for the professional nursing roles of Members of a Profession (MOP), Provider of Patient-Centered Care (PPCC),

- 2. Describe the basic methods used in the administration of drugs. (PPCC)
- 3. Identify common drug classifications. (PPCC, MHCT)
- 4. Identify common drugs within these various drug classifications. (PPCC, PSA)
- 5. Describe the uses, contraindications, precautions, interactions, and general adverse reactions of the common drugs within these classifications. (PPCC, PSA, MHCT)
- 6. Discuss ways to promote an optimal response to therapy, how to manage adverse reactions, and important points to keep in mind when educating patients about the use of these drugs. (PSA, PPCC, MOP)

- 1. Reading the designated material in the book and online
- 2. Completing the module quizzes, unit exams, and final comprehensive exam
- 3. Completing one assignment
- 4. Participating in online communication and discussion

Evaluation of Students:

The final grade will be a standard percentage, not curved, composed as follows:

- 20% from module quizzes
- 60% from unit exams
- 15% from a comprehensive final exam
- 5% from one assignment
- 2% from one Syllabus quiz
- 1. There will be 10 module quizzes, each worth 2% of your overall grade. Modules are made up of multiple chapters from your textbook. Each quiz has a combination of 25-35 multiple choice and multiple answer questions. You will have 40 minutes to take each quiz. You may take them from any computer (work, home, etc.) You will get your grade as soon as you submit the quiz. Pharmacology will be an important part of your career as a health care provider, and you really need to learn the material. Because of this, you may take the module quizzes over and over for the next 24 hours after the due date until you are satisfied with your grade. The final time that you take each exam will count as your grade. The reason that I allow this is because you will probably need to look up the answers for the questions you miss. The more times you look at the material, the better you should learn it. You will find chapter objectives, study notes, and a power point for each chapter under the "Modules" tab in Canvas.
- There will be 3-unit exams, each worth 20% of your overall grade. Each unit exam covers 3-4 modules. Each unit exam will have a combination of 50-60 multiple choice and multiple answer questions. You will have 60 minutes to take each unit exam. All of these exams must be taken with the LockDown Browser software. You will get your grade as soon as you submit the exam.
- 3. There will be 1 comprehensive final exam, worth 15% of your overall grade. It will cover all of the modules. It will have a combination of 50 multiple choice and multiple answer questions. You will have 60 minutes to take it. It must also be taken with the LockDown Browser software. You will get your grade as soon as you submit the exam.
- 4. There will be 1 assignment. The Video Assignment is worth 3% of your course grade. Detailed instructions for can be found under the specific assignment in Canvas.
