# Midland College Syllabus RNSG 1443 Complex Concepts of Adult Health (3-3-0)

#### COVID-19 Addendum:

Classes are face to face with an online component.

## **Course Description:**

Integration of previous knowledge and skills related to common adult health needs into the continued development of the professional nurse as a provider of patient-centered care, patient safety advocate, member of health care team and member of the profession in the care of adult patients and families with complex medical-surgical care needs associated with body systems. Emphasis on complex knowledge, judgment, skills and professional values within a legal/ethical framework. This course lends itself to a blocked approach.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of the course the student will:

- 1. Choose safe, compassionate patient-centered care for culturally diverse patients and families who are experiencing complex health care issues (PPCC-E).
- 2. Correlate safety and quality of care to achieve positive patient outcomes (PSA-B, PPCC-E)
- 3. Investigate patient care technologies, information systems, and communication skills that support safe nursing practice (MHCT-D).
- 4. Formulate nursing judgment based on best current evidence that integrates nursing science in the provision of safe, quality care for patients with complex health care issues (PPCC-A, E, PSA-B).
- 5. Identify standards of practice within the legal, ethical and regulatory framework of the professional nurse (MOP-A, B).
- 6. Apply knowledge of leadership skills, including delegation, supervision and prioritization (PSA-F, MHCT-E).

## **Student Learning Outcomes:**

Refer to Canvas in Modules for Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs).

- 1. Submission of assignments is electronic to be uploaded as a PDF document (no jpg) or manual; manual submissions must be neat and written legibly. All assignments must have correct grammar, spelling, and correct use of APA at the instructor request.
- 2. Honesty and integrity are expected; students are to work on assignments independently, unless group work is assigned. ATI templates are to be legibly handwritten only; no typewritten submission will be accepted.
- 3. The grades earned for this course will consist of 4-unit exams and a comprehensive final exam covering the lecture material in the course. One proctored ATI Content Mastery exam will be given: 2019 Nutrition. Students will turn in templates for Practice A from last semester the 2<sup>nd</sup> week of the semester. Additionally, students will have 1 required practice attempt (B) for the nutrition exam before attempting the content mastery; the practice exam will be counted as a daily grade and must include remediation templates and required time for focused review. Additionally, Med-Surg Practice A and Pharmacology Practice A will be completed during this course. Templates and focused review will be turned in per the direction of the 4<sup>th</sup> semester instructor.
- 4. Refer to the course calendar for assignments and exams.

### Student Contributions, Responsibilities and Class Policies:

- Students will be expected to comply with the policies outlines in the Midland College Catalogue and Student Handbook and the Midland College Associate Degree Nursing Program Student Handbook.
- 2. Students will be expected to attend class on time and to be prepared with weekly content that is assigned and will be reviewed in class.
  - Refer to course calendar for course content and weekly assignments.
  - If a student is late for class, the student will be required to stay outside the class until there is a break which is offered periodically throughout the class time.
  - If an absence is unavoidable, the student is responsible for obtaining covered material from another student.
- 3. Students will be expected to bring their required textbook(s) and additional material as requested.

- 4. Students can expect class time will be used primarily for lectures, application exercises such as case studies, concept maps, poster boards, role-playing, group activities, simulation, independent study, non-proctored guizzes, proctored testing, and guest speakers.
  - Class participation is crucial for successful completion of course.
  - Students are expected to be accountable for their own learning.
  - The student is responsible for any material covered through lecture, audio-visual media, class presentations, independent study, required readings and assignments, and guest speakers. This information will be included on the unit and final exams.
  - Students are expected to determine what they need to study and to solicit assistance from the
    instructor as needed. Students may contact the instructor by preferred method during campus
    hours M-F 0800-1700, scheduled office hours, and by appointment.
- 5. Students will be expected to utilize the online environment primarily through Canvas and Assessment Technology Institute (ATI) online learning system nursing products. In addition, other online learning environments may be utilized by the instructor.
  - If a student has access issues with off-campus connections, the student is responsible to contact the online entity to resolve the issue.
  - If a student has computer issues on his or her personal computer, the student is responsible for resolving the issue and must be prepared to have a back-up plan.
- 6. Students are expected to exhibit honesty and integrity.
  - Students are to work on assignments and submit work without any assistance from family, other students, or friends unless the instructor has authorized collaboration or group work.
  - Students are not to share, copy, or take a picture of assignments and/or share with other students. If it is discovered and confirmed the above was violated, disciplinary action will be taken up to and including program dismissal.
- 7. All assigned course work must be complete with submission on or before the due date as posted on the course calendar.
  - No assignment is optional.
  - If an assignment is late, the student will receive zero "0" points in the grade book for the assignment.

### Testing:

Course exams in the Associate Degree Nursing program will adhere to the testing policy found in the Nursing Student Handbook.

### **ATI Practice and Proctored Content Mastery Exams:**

Students will participate in ATI practice and Content Mastery exams. Refer to the attached "Requirements and Grading Grid for ATI Content Mastery Exams."

## **Evaluation of Students:**

A course grade of ≥ 70% or better is necessary to pass RNSG 1443. There will be no rounding of final grades. A semester grade of less than "C" will not be acceptable as passing in any required nursing course or course leading to a degree.

A= 100-90

B= < 90 and ≥80

C=< 80 and ≥70

D=< 70 and ≥60

F= < 60

Note: To qualify to take the final exam in RNSG 1443, the student must have a passing average ≥ 70% on the unit exams. If the average of the unit exams is less than 70% at the time the final exam is given, the student will not be allowed to take the final exam and will receive a grade of "D" in the course. The Re-admission policy found in the Nursing Student Handbook applies to students seeking to repeat the course.

Students are required to schedule a conference with the instructor for any unit exam score ≤ 70%. Scheduling the conference with the instructor is the student's responsibility. The student will sign up online in the Canvas calendar to secure a date and time slot; this is first come, first served. A link will be provided by the instructor.
