Classes at Midland College are face to face with an online component.

Course Description

Review of concepts required for licensure examination and entry into the practice of professional nursing. Includes review of application process of National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) test plan, assessment of knowledge deficits, and remediation. This course lends itself to either a blocked or integrated approach.

Prerequisites: Completion of third semester traditional courses or second semester transition courses or approval of program chair.

Student Contributions, Responsibilities and Class Policies:

- 1. Students will be expected to comply with the policies outlines in the Midland College Catalogue and Student Handbook and the Midland College Associate Degree Nursing Program Student Handbook.
- 2. Students will be expected to attend class on time and to be prepared with weekly content that is assigned and will be reviewed in class.

 - If a student is late for class, the student will be required to stay outside the class until there is a break which are offered periodically throughout the class time.
 - If an absence is unavoidable, the student is responsible for obtaining covered material from another student.
- 3. Students will be expected to bring their required textbook(s) and additional material as requested.
- 4. Students can expect class time will be used primarily for lectures, application exercises such as case studies, test taking strategies, concept maps, poster boards, role-playing, group activities, simulation, independent study, non-proctored quizzes, proctored testing, and guest speakers.
 - Class participation is crucial for successful completion of course.
 - Students are expected to be accountable for their own learning.
 - The student is responsible for any material covered through lecture, audio-visual media, class presentations, independent study, required readings and assignments, and guest speakers.
 - Students are expected to determine what they need to study and to solicit assistance from the instructor as needed. Students may contact the instructor by preferred method during campus hours M-F 0800-1700, scheduled office hours, and by appointment.

- 5. Students will be expected to utilize the online environment primarily through Canvas and Assessment Technology Institute (ATI) online learning system nursing products. In addition, other online learning environments may be utilized by the instructor.
 - If a student has access issues with off-campus connections, the student is responsible to contact the online entity to resolve the issue.
 - If a student has computer issues on their personal computer, the student is responsible for resolving the issue and must be prepared to have a back-up plan.
- 6. Students are expected to exhibit honesty and integrity.
 - Students are to work on assignments and submit work without any assistance from family, other students, or friends unless the instructor has authorized collaboration or group work.
 - Students are not to share, copy, or take a picture of assignments and/or share with other students. If it is discovered and confirmed the above was violated, disciplinary action will be taken up to and including program dismissal.
- 7. All assigned course work must be complete with submission on or before the due date as posted on the course calendar.
 - No assignment is optional.
 - If an assignment is late, the student will receive a "0" points in the grade book for the assignment.
 - Submission of every assignment must be complete before the end of the semester except for extenuating circumstances where the student receives a grade of Incomplete "I."
- 8. Students are expected to submit assignments electronically or manually with correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation.
 - If an assignment is submitted manually it must be neat and clean, without creases, stains, or smell of tobacco or perfume.
- 9. While in class, students must not make or receive phone calls, receive or send text messages, or participate in any way with media communication except as requested by the instructor. There will be no recording of the instructor at any time. Internet use is for course assignments and research only.

Testing:

Course exams in the Associate Degree Nursing program will adhere to the Testing policy found in the Nursing Student Handbook. All exams will be taken online on the ATI platform.

ATI Practice and Proctored Content Mastery Exams:

Students will participate in the ATI Comprehensive Predictor exam and practice exams. Refer to the attached "Requirements and Grading Grid for ATI Comprehensive Predictor Exams."

Evaluation of Students:

1. A course grade of 850.5 points (≥70%) is necessary to pass RNSG 2130 as well as a 94% likelihood of passing NCLEX on predictor. There will be no rounding of final grades.

A = 1215 - 1093.5 points B = 1093 - 972 points C = 971 - 850.5 points D = 850 - 729 points F = \leq 728 points

2. All of the following requirements must be met in order to pass the class based on the following requirements:

ATI Comprehensive Predictor: 210 points

Remediation Practice A & B 200 points (100 points A and 100 points B)

Comprehensive Predictor 1st attempt: 10 points 1st Attempt ≥94% No Retake Required

Comprehensive Predictor 1st attempt:

0 points 1st Attempt ≤94% Retake Required

Comprehensive Predictor 2nd attempt:

8/10 points 2nd Attempt ≥94% No Retake Required

0/10 points 2nd Attempt ≤94% No Retake Allowed Complete a Plan for Success

*Note: If after the second attempt a predicted probability score that is less than 94%, the student will be assigned a grade of incomplete "I" in RNSG 2130 and will be required to complete a Plan for Success in order to achieve a passing grade in RNSG 2130. Refer to Nursing Student Handbook on Exit Exam.

- **RN ATI Capstone: 230 points.** The student will be enrolled in the ATI Capstone Content Review and will be required to complete all components of the review. Remedial templates are required in order to receive points for post work. Points for Capstone are assigned over 7 weeks in content modules as follows:
- Pre-Assessment Quiz: 10 points
- Content Assessment: 10 points
- Post-Assessment Assignment: 10 points
- 5 points for all questions answered correctly
- 5 points for answers given in own words, not copied and pasted
- Total points per week 30 x7 weeks=210
 - Pharmacology II Assessment 10 points
 - Medical-surgical II Assessment 10 points

Points/Late Policy:

Points are earned for completion of assignments by the due date posted in the ATI Capstone Content Review Schedule. o No points will be awarded for late assignments.

Student will receive an alert within the review 24 hours prior to assignment due dates. ATI Educator will provide feedback on post-assessment assignments within 48 hours of submission excluding weekends and holidays.

- ATI Virtual completion at 50% stage pre-graduation: 200 points. The student will be enrolled in the Virtual-ATI and successful engagement in the Virtual-ATI NCLEX Review includes completion of the following:
- Beginning NCLEX Strategies Module: 50 points
- 25% Stage Fundamentals Module: 50 points
- 25% Stage Pharmacology Module: 50 points

• 50% Stage Medical-surgical Module and remediation: 50 points

Total points for Virtual-ATI: 200 points

Note: Virtual ATI points to be awarded after completion of 4 weeks of review at the 50% stage.

Points/Late Policy is the same as above.

Refer to Canvas course calendar and ATI Virtual calendar for assignment due dates. Students will be strongly encouraged to continue with the review to increase their chances of NCLEX success, but not required to complete Virtual-ATI in the weeks after course completion.

- Texas State Board of Nursing Juris Prudence exam: 5 points. The student will take the nursing Juris Prudence examination (NJE). This is a 50-question exam and the student must correctly answer 75% of the questions to pass the NJE. The student will have two (2) hours to complete the NJE. The NJE must be completed in one sitting. If the student has already successfully passed the Juris Prudence exam (i.e., LVN), the instructor will require another assignment in place of the Juris Prudence. Points/Late Policy is the same as above.
- ATI Critical Thinking Exit Exam: 0 points. The student prior to graduation will take the ATI Critical Thinking Exit Exam. There is no grade assigned to the exam, however, the student will complete the exam.
- Attend and successfully complete the ATI 3 Day Virtual NCLEX review: 0 points. As scheduled per course calendar, no absences will be allowed during the NCLEX review. The student must fully participate in the NCLEX review and be attentive to only NCLEX review. No other studying will be allowed. Only materials requested/required by NCLEX review will be allowed at the NCLEX review.

Students who have enrolled in a Texas public institution of higher education as a first-time freshman in Fall 2007 or later are permitted to drop no more than six (6) courses during the entire undergraduate career.
