# Midland College Syllabus VNSG 1304 Foundations of Nursing (2-3-0)

# General Course Information

## Course Description

Introduction to the nursing profession including history, standards of practice, legal/ethical issues, and the role of the vocational nurse in the healthcare setting. Topics will include basic content on normal physiological functions as it relates to body systems, pharmacological principles, therapeutic communication, cultural and spiritual diversity, nursing process, and holistic awareness.

## WECM End of Course Outcomes

Demonstrate the ability to recognize the components of the nursing process, while providing nursing care according to the nursing process. Identify the role of the LVN as it relates to delegation, legal and ethical decisions, and therapeutic nurse-patient communication.

## Student Learning Outcomes and Core Competencies

The following course student learning outcomes (SLO's) are based on the Differentiated Essential Competencies (DECs) identified by the Texas Board of Nursing for the nursing roles of Member of the Profession (MOP), Provider of Patient-Centered Care (PPCC), Patient Safety Advocate (PSA), and Member of the Health Care Team (MHCT). Upon successful completion of the course, the student will:

- 1. Identify roles and legal ethical professional responsibilities of a vocational nurse. (MOP-B)
- 2. Identify characteristics of a therapeutic nurse/patient relationship through use of therapeutic communication and collaboration. (MHCT-A)
- 3. Describe components of the nursing process, clinical reasoning, and holistic approach for problem solving in vocational nursing care and practice in a variety of health care settings. (PPCC-B)
- 4. Delegate and educate within the vocational nursing scope of practice. (MHCT-E)
- 5. Discuss the use of complementary health approaches in integrative medicine. (PPCC-E)
- 6. Identify common physical and psychosocial problems of the older adult including end-of-life stages. (PPCC-A)
